Impact Description:

Impact on Surface Water: The proposed action may involve construction within or adjoining a freshwater or tidal wetland, or in the bed or banks of any other water body (See EAF part 2, 3D.)

This project involves the replacement of the Village's existing sewage collection system due to age and deterioration of the pipes. According to flow data from the Village Sewage Treatment Plant, infiltration of groundwater into the sewage collection system is occurring. The existing collection system will be replaced with a watertight system. It is anticipated that flooding will continue to occur in localized areas within the Village where a stormwater collection system does not exist. As such, this project involves a hydrologic analysis followed by design and installation of a new stormwater collection system for the Village. It is anticipated that an outfall pipe will be installed conveying the stormwater into the Great South Bay. As stormwater already is eventually discharged into the Great South Bay through an existing outfall, the concern for impact involves the replacement of the outfall pipe in proximity to the Great South Bay. Specific actions will be taken to minimize the impact to this waterbody during construction of the outfall.

Mitigation Measures to be Incorporated into the Project:

The Contractor shall be required to prepare and implement an Environmental Protection Plan, documenting the contractor's means and methods of performing the work in conformity with all applicable laws and permits, taking into account, protection of the Great South Bay.

All work shall be performed in accordance with New York State Department of Environmental Conservation ("NYSDEC") Tidal Wetland permit to be obtained. Subsequent to permit issuance, the construction manager will monitor the work done by the Contractor to ensure consistent compliance. All work shall be performed in accordance with New York State Department of Environmental Conservation ("NYSDEC") State Pollutant Discharge Elimination System ("SPDES") permit to be obtained. Subsequent to permit issuance, the construction manager will monitor the work done by the

Contractor to ensure consistent compliance.

All work shall be performed in accordance with a Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan ("SWPPP") that is compliant with Village and State requirements. The SWPPP will mandate certain Best Management Practices ("BMPs") and measures intended to prevent any project related sediment, hazardous chemicals, spills, erosion, or other pollutants from infiltrating into the ground or being discharged to surface waters.

In order to protect the Great South Bay, the project contract documents will provide for any applicable temporary or permanent run-off, erosion, and sediment controls including silt fences, erosion fabric, straw bale, turbidity curtain and vegetation.
